The meeting was called to order at 2:02 p.m. by Chairman Turcotte.

On motion by Dr. Keenum and seconded by Ms. Ross, all Board Members legally present and participating voted unanimously to approve the minutes of the board meeting held on January 16, 2019 as originally drafted.

#### **REGULAR AGENDA ITEMS**

#### 1. Presentation of Update to the FY 2019 Appropriation and Allocation

Ms. Rogers presented information regarding the updated FY 2019 appropriation of spending authority and the source of the newly appropriated funds. She explained how the additional spending authority would be allocated. No action was required by the Board

#### **Summary:**

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid presents an updated appropriation and appropriation for Fiscal Year 2019 due to receipt of deficit spending authority during the 2019 Legislative Session. The 2019 Mississippi Legislature passed HB 1667, Appropriation; additional for various state agencies for Fiscal Year 2019. The original FY 2019 appropriation, shown below, was \$42.3 million. The deficit appropriation provides an additional \$1,500,000 in Spending Authority for Student Financial Aid. The funds will be allocated to support the Higher Education Legislative Plan (HELP) Grant. The language in the appropriation bill allows for the use of the additional funds through June 30, 2020, so any unspent funds will be carried forward.

Recommendation: No action is required.

#### 2. Presentation of FY 2020 Appropriation and Approval of Appropriation Allocation

Ms. Rogers presented the FY 2020 appropriation and proposed plan of allocation. The Board discussed the legislative language used in the appropriation bill to set aside funds for specific programs. On motion by Dr. Keenum, seconded by Dr. Burnett, all Board Members legally present and participating voted unanimously to approve the allocation of the FY 2020 Appropriation as proposed, except the \$550,000 proposed for allocation to the William Winter Teacher and William Winter Alternate Route Teacher Forgivable Loans and the Mississippi Teacher Loan Repayment Program would be allocated instead to decrease the deficit in funding for the undergraduate grant programs.

Summary:

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid presents the Fiscal Year 2020 Appropriation and requests approval of the appropriation allocation for the 2019-20 aid year.

The 2019 Mississippi Legislature passed SB 3007, Appropriation; IHL – Student Financial Aid. The FY 2020 appropriation is \$43.06 million, which is \$8.05 million or 15.8% below the amount requested in the Mississippi Budget Request (MBR) developed by the Office and approved by the Postsecondary Board in June 2018.

Miss. Code Ann. § 37-106-14 (2) requires the Board to award grants first and limit loans to renewal applicants only on a first-come, first-served basis with preference for renewals. If grants are fully funded, the budget still faces a deficit. Therefore, no loans may be awarded, except in the programs that receive specific appropriation through the appropriation bill. In some specific appropriation cases, the appropriation bill requires funding, and in other cases, the appropriation bill allows funding. In the two most recent years, the Board has elected to fund renewal applicants only in the programs for which funding is allowed but not required. The appropriation bill provides specific appropriation for certain programs as follows:

- Required funding SREB Regional Contract Program (SREB): Section 4. It is the intention of the Legislature that...the Board...shall expend...an amount not exceeding the funding necessary, contingent upon the availability of qualified applicants, for nine (9) new entering optometry students and the number of returning optometry students who received funding under the program during the preceding school year.
- Allowed funding Speech-Language Pathologist Forgivable Loan (SLPL): Section 10. Of the funds appropriated in Section 1, an amount not to exceed Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) is provided for the Speech-Language Pathologists Loan Forgiveness Program....
- Allowed funding Teacher Education Scholars Forgivable Loan (TES): Section 11. Of the funds appropriated in Section 1, an amount not to exceed One Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) is provided for the Teacher Education Scholars Program....
- Allowed funding William Winter Teacher/Alternate Route Teacher Forgivable Loans (WWAR/WWTS) and Mississippi Teacher Loan Repayment (MTLR): Section 13. Of the funds appropriated in Section 1, an amount not to exceed Five Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$550,000.00) is provided for the William F. Winter Teacher Forgivable Loan Program. Note: All programs are authorized by the same code section due to HB 150 (2019 Legislative Session).

Exhibit 1 on page 8 shows the FY 2020 Proposed Allocation. The MBR Awards and Amounts are the original budget created for the MBR in June 2018. The Projected Awards and Amounts are the projections revised during the 2019 Legislative session to better reflect the projected need. The AOB Amount is the proposed allocation based on the appropriation, and the final column represents the deficit appropriation needed.

Exhibit 2 on page 9 shows the Allocation Comparisons. The table shows a comparison of the proposed award budget for 2018-19, the actual awards made during 2018-19, and the proposed award budget for 2019-20.

Recommendation: Board staff recommends approval of this item.

# 3. Approval of Updates to APA Part 653: Nursing Education Forgivable Loan (NELB/NELM/NELM/NERM/NELP) to Change Service Options

On motion by Mr. Bush and seconded by Ms. Ross, all Board Members legally present and participating voted unanimously to approve the updates to the Nursing Education Forgivable Loan Rules and Regulations to change the service options.

#### **Summary:**

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid requests approval of changes to APA Part 653: Nursing Education Forgivable Loan (NELB/NELR/NELM/NERM/NELP) Rules and Regulations to update the service options. Currently, a recipient of the Nursing Education Forgivable Loan – MSN or PhD/DNP (NELM or NELP) may also receive the Nursing Teacher Stipend (NTSP) at the same time. Students who take advantage of both programs must teach in a Mississippi School of Nursing. Recipients of NTSP are currently allowed to teach part-time to fulfill the service obligation, but part-time teaching is not accepted for recipients of NELM or NELP. The requested change would align the service requirements for the three programs. The Board previously approved changes to APA Part 653 in April 2017.

#### V. REPAYMENT

- B. Cancellation through Nursing Service
  - 1. An NELB, NELR, NELM, NERM, and NELP forgivable loan recipient must meet all of the following criteria to qualify for debt cancellation through nursing service:
    - a) Have the appropriate nursing license, as determined by the Mississippi Board of Nursing.
    - Work in professional nursing in Mississippi by either teaching nursing full-time at an accredited School of Nursing, or by performing other work in professional nursing in the interest of public health on a full-time or part-time basis. "Full-time" is understood by the parties to mean that the nurse or instructor shall maintain the normal full-time work schedule where the nurse or instructor is employed. "Part-time/adjunct" is understood by the parties to mean that the professional nurse shall maintain a work schedule of no fewer than 20 hours per week, and the nurse instructor shall be classified as less than a 1.0 FTE at an individual institution. Less than 1.0 FTEs can be added together if an individual is teaching at more than one accredited Schools of Nursing in Mississisppi.
    - c) Work in professional nursing in Mississippi. NOTE: It is fully understood that it is the responsibility of the forgivable loan recipient to seek and secure employment. The Board assumes no obligation to perform that function.

2. For NELB, NELR, NELM, NERM, and NELP recipients working fultime, the forgivable loan debt shall be cancelled on the basis of one year's service for one year of forgivable loan received. For NELB, NELR, NELM, NERM, and NELP recipients working part-time, the forgivable loan debt shall be cancelled on the basis of two years' service for one year of forgivable loan received. For all NELB, NELR, NELM, NERM, and NELP recipients, such service shall never be less than twelve (12) consecutive months for full-time public health work, twenty-four (24) consecutive months for part-time public health work, one (1) year of 1.0 FTE for full-time teaching, two (2) years of .50 FTE for part-time/adjunct teaching or one (1) academic year for teaching, regardless of the length of study provided under this forgivable loan.

Recommendation: Board staff recommends approval of this item.

# 4. Approval of Updates to APA Part 667: Critical Needs Dyslexia Therapy Forgivable Loan (CNDT) to Change Service Options

On motion by Dr. Keenum and seconded by Ms. Lamar, all Board Members legally present and participating voted unanimously to approve the updates to the Critical Needs Dyslexia Therapy Forgivable Loan Rules and Regulations to change the service options.

#### Summary:

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid requests approval of changes to APA Part 667: Critical Needs Dyslexia Therapy Forgivable Loan (CNDT) Rules and Regulations to update the service options. CNDT was created in 2012 to encourage teachers to pursue a master's degree in dyslexia therapy to earn a 203 educator's license designation. The program previously required recipients to serve as full-time dyslexia therapists in a Mississippi public or charter school to fulfill the service obligation, but many schools and districts do not have the funds to support such positions full-time. Therefore, many CNDT loan recipients have been unable to find appropriate employment. The 2019 Mississippi Legislature passed HB 150, Mississippi Dyslexia Forgivable Loan Program; clarify type of service committee to qualify for. The legislation allows CNDT recipients who complete the program and earn the 203 license designation to work full-time in a public or charter school as a teacher or therapist. The requested changes reflect the altered legislation. The Board previously approved changes to APA Part 667 in September 2016.

#### V. REPAYMENT

- B. Cancellation through Service
  - 1. A CNDT forgivable loan recipient must meet all of the following criteria to qualify for debt cancellation through service:
    - a) Obtain a "AA" Mississippi Educator License with a 203 Dyslexia Therapy designation.

- b) Serve full-time, as defined by the State Board of Education, as a teacher, Dyslexia Therapist, or other position that combines instruction with the clinical provision of therapy for dyslexia. Invalid positions include, but are not limited to, the following: assistant teacher, full-time substitute, high school counselor, curriculum specialist or administrator.
- c) Provide instruction and/or dyslexia therapy for students in grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) in a Mississippi public school/district or public charter school. NOTE: It is fully understood that it is the responsibility of the forgivable loan recipient to seek and secure appropriate employment as a Dyslexia Therapist in an appropriate school/district. Neither the Board nor the State Board of Education assumes the obligation to perform that function. Prospective teachers may contact the Mississippi Teacher Center for placement assistance at www.mde.k12.ms.us/mtc.
- 2. A CNDT forgivable loan debt shall be cancelled on the basis of one year's service for one annual forgivable loan award received. For all CNDT recipients, such service shall never be less than one (1) year regardless of the length of study provided under this forgivable loan.

Recommendation: Board staff recommends approval of this item.

## 5. Approval of Updates to Rules and Regulations to Change Legislative Code References

On motion by Dr. Burnett and seconded by Dr. Melvin, all Board Members legally present and participating voted unanimously to approve the updates to APA Part 601 and APA Part 681 to change the legislative code references.

#### Summary:

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid requests approval of changes to APA Part 601: Authority and Responsibilities and APA Part 681: Mississippi Teacher Loan Repayment (MTLR) Rules and Regulations to update the legislative code references. In 2014, the Legislature discontinued the Critical Needs Teacher Forgivable Loan Program, authorized in Section 37-106-55. The Mississippi Teacher Loan Repayment program (MTLR) was originally authorized as part of the Critical Needs program. The Legislature recognized the value of MTLR and did not wish to discontinue it, so the MTLR authorizing language was inserted into the code section for the Teacher Education Scholars Alternate Route Certification Forgivable Loan program (TESA) in Section 37-106-79, but TESA requires specific appropriation and has never been funded. Therefore, MTLR could no longer be funded. The 2019 Mississippi Legislature passed HB 150, Mississippi Dyslexia Forgivable Loan Program; clarify type of service committee to qualify for. The bill was amended to move the MTLR code section into the authorizing chapter for the William Winter Teacher Forgivable Loan program to ensure that MTLR is funded when all other forgivable loans are funded. The requested changes reflect the altered legislation. The Board previously approved changes to APA Part 601 in April 2018 and to APA Part 681 in March 2015.

#### A. APA Part 601: Authority and Responsibilities Rules and Regulations

APA Part 601: Authority and Responsibilities Rules and Regulations Chapter 3: Authority of the Mississippi Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board

Rule 3.1 Authority of the Mississippi Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board. The Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board is granted authority by the State of Mississippi for administration of various state student financial assistance programs. Authority is granted by the legal statutes authorizing such programs as follows:

# 6. Approval of First Read of Updates to Rules for Active Programs to Change Application Deadlines:

Ms. Rogers presented for first read a proposal to move the application deadline date for active programs to May 1 for all programs. Ms. Rogers provided a handout (Exhibit A) that shows the number of 2018-19 MTAG recipients who made application after the proposed May 1 deadline date and the number of 2018-19 HELP applicants who missed HELP-eligibility because they made application after the current March 31 deadline. The Board discussed the issue at length, noting the positive impact the change would have on potential HELP applicants, the negative impact the change could have on some MTAG applicants, and the additional cost the change would likely incur. The Board did not take action but tabled the conversation for further consideration during the regularly scheduled June meeting.

#### **Summary:**

The Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid requests approval to change the application deadline to May 1 and the supporting document deadline to June 1 for most active programs, beginning with the 2020-2021application cycle, which opens October 1, 2019. The change would simplify the aid application process by having one set of deadlines instead of multiple sets of deadlines for different programs. The change would also prioritize the Higher Education Legislative Plan for Needy Students Grant (HELP) by providing more time for low- and lower-middle-income students to apply for need-based aid. The change would also provide more time for students to apply for loans and would encourage other grant applicants to apply earlier. While this change would likely increase the cost of the HELP grant by providing students one additional month to apply, it would also decrease the cost of the Mississippi Tuition Assistance Grant (MTAG) and the Mississippi Eminent Scholars Grant (MESG) by shortening the application period from one year to about eight months.

The following rules will be changed to move the application deadline from September 15 to May 1 and the supporting document deadline from October 15 to June 1:

About 15 months ago, the Mississippi Office of Student Financial Aid entered into a two-phase agreement with Mississippi State University's National Strategic Planning & Analysis Research Center (NSPARC) to 1) move the administration and maintenance of the existing state aid application from the Mississippi Department of Information Technology Services (ITS) to NSPARC; and 2) rewrite the state aid application and create a user-friendly student account dashboard. Phase 1 was completed on schedule in time for the 'old' application to open as scheduled on October 1, 2018. Phase 2 is scheduled for completion this summer.

New and improved features of the Mississippi Aid Application (MAAPP) include:

- Application name and logo
- Overall look and feel
- Login process
- Multiple user roles
- Dashboard style
- Available information
- Message repository
- Streamlined application

Recommendation: No action is required.
